
Det. Sgt. Scott Whalen

Detective Sergeant Scott Whalen has been a member of the Somerville Police Department for the last 13 years. Sergeant Whalen has attended countless specialized training programs to develop his skills in the area of forensic investigations. During a recent investigation against a women who allegedly had an inappropriate relationship with a minor child, Sgt. Whalen performed various searches of numerous electronic devices including the victim's cell phones and IPAD, as well as the suspect's cell phone, work computer, IPAD, and personal lap top. These searches yielded enough incriminating information to establish probable cause to search the defendant's home, vehicle, and other electronic devices which yielded a far greater quantity and quality of evidence. Computer forensics is a difficult area to learn and develop as a skill. It was only through Sergeant Whalen's training, experience, and ability to conduct these searches so quickly, efficiently, and accurately that so much evidence was obtained and that this woman was indicted. Sergeant Whalen's dedication to his work is cause for recognition of the Beyond the Call of Duty award for the month of August 2014.

Somerville Community Preservation Act – op-ed from Community Preservation Committee members

In November 2012, Somerville voters overwhelmingly supported the adoption of the Community Preservation Act (CPA). The CPA establishes a small residential tax surcharge to be used exclusively for historic preservation, open space, outdoor recreation, and affordable housing in Somerville. Investments in all of these areas will improve our city and ensure that we remain a welcome home to people of all backgrounds.


Combining the surcharge, the Board of Aldermen's generous match, and the state match we will receive, the City will have at least \$4.5 million for CPA projects in the coming year. The Community Preservation Committee (CPC) looks forward to receiving applications for projects that will make Somerville a better place to live – projects of all sizes and from all corners of the city. No idea is a bad idea, and we are excited to see what creative ways you have to use this money. Although only property owners can apply for funding for projects on their land, if you and your neighbors have particular projects in mind for public properties, we encourage you to speak with your Aldermen and the relevant City Departments, and to help advocate for the projects you believe would benefit your neighborhood. The Board of Aldermen has the final determination on the projects the CPC recommends funding, so working with your Aldermen will help familiarize them with the benefits of projects on which they may be voting.

Over the last eight months, the CPC worked diligently with our residents, elected officials, community groups, and others to create a plan that serves as a guideline for our priorities in assessing applications. We held several public hearings, on both ends of the city, to maximize public input on how we prioritize spending money on projects in our neighborhoods.

Based on this process, we decided to devote 45% of our budget – at least \$2.1 million this year – to create or retain permanent affordable housing and support programs that achieve the same. Affordable housing is a critical need that is expensive to provide. This investment will help keep Somerville families in their homes, continue our long tradition of welcoming diverse new residents, and help house our homeless. We are proud to partner with Somerville's Affordable Housing Trust Fund, who will evaluate applications for CPA funding for affordable housing projects. With more than 20 years of experience funding these very projects, the Trust's expertise will be immeasurably helpful.

Again, reflecting community priorities, we are also devoting 15% of our budget, a minimum of \$700,000 in this year alone, to create, preserve, and rehabilitate recreational and open space. Somerville is the most densely populated community in New England,

In Massachusetts, the Import-Export Bank has helped out 161 companies with financing for \$4 bil-

2007—none west of Route 91 and only 13 west of Worcester.

The bank's top client in the Bay State is Wellesley's Grove Services, one of the world's largest poultry and meat traders. Grove Services, which got its start selling chickens to the Soviet Union, secured financing for more than \$1 billion worth of deals.

Another struggling familyowned business is Carver's Decas Cranberry Products, which had \$70 million with worth of tart berries fiananced.

No Somerville company received help in the last seven years. But a Cambridge company founded by Harvard University researchers, Cambridge NanoTech got financing for \$25 million in the last seven years. In what universe do Harvard researchers have to go to the taxpayers for a little bump?

As with rent control, where the connected fancies and swells end up with pricecontrolled apartments meant for the poor, Import-Export Bank deals end up going to the companies with connections and more often than not to companies that simply do not need the help. Our randy, red-haired founding father Thomas Jefferson was all about the need for constant revolution. It was this mindset that blinded him to the dangers of the French Revolution and certainly led him to suggest: "What signify a few lives lost in a century or two?" Lucky for us, the American economy serves that refreshing and renewing process that Jefferson yearned for without the blood of patriots and tyrants that he called the natural manure of the tree of Institutions like the Import-Export Bank need to go. 

and we have among the least amount of green space per resident. We must prioritize not only the creation of more green space, but the improvement of those areas we already have. Somerville has done an admirable job of this over the past twenty years – the availability of CPA funding allows us to do even more. Similarly, we are dedicating 15% of our budget to historic preservation projects. We are fortunate to have historic landmarks, homes, and artifacts within our borders. Until now, we have not had adequate resources to preserve them. With the availability of CPA money, we hope to protect these resources for genera-

We have set aside a full 20% – at least \$930,000 this year – as an unrestricted reserve to supplement, if appropriate, projects in the three focus areas. While we are not required to spend this reserve during this year, it is helpful to be able to fund specific, worthy projects that go above and beyond the already-budgeted amount. We expect to direct this money mostly toward open space and historic projects, in light of our high initial commitment to affordable housing. The money that is not spent this year will be saved for projects in future years. Finally, up to 5% of the budget, or up to \$230,000, may be used for administrative costs – paying for a much-needed historic preservation plan, due diligence on project proposals, and our staff person's salary. Unspent administrative funding will also be devoted to projects in future years.

We look forward to hearing your ideas for new projects and working with you to make Somerville a better place to live for all of us.







This past Saturday morning, Mayor Joseph Curtatone, the City of Somerville and its Veteran Services Department, honored Donald Curtin at Hodgkins-Curtin Park with a Veterans Memorial Ceremony re-dedication of a new granite memorial stone.

Friends, relatives and elected officials were in attendance to honor the Somerville native, Donald L. Curtin.

The site is named after William H. Hodgkins, a former state senator, and a Mayor of Somerville in 1896 when an expansive three-story brick building was constructed to replace the small school house that existed. Donald L. Curtin was born September 6, 1944. He gave his life in 1969 in Thua Thien Province, South Vietnam and his remains are interred at the Somerville Veterans Cemetery.

Hodgkins-Curtin Park is 1.5 acres, making it one of the largest City-owned public open spaces in Somerville. The playground preserves the basic layout of the popular "Yellow Park" playground for which the park has long been known.

The playground features separate play areas for younger and older children, an extensive sand play area, interactive water table play feature, and boulders set within a river theme. The park includes picnic and cafe tables, new lighting, plantings, and a children's walking and riding pathway. The newly renovated ball field accommodates Little League baseball, family outings, City festivals and public events.

Morelli Arrest On September 4th, 2014 at approximately 7:31 a.m., I, Officer Goncalves, while in uniformed patrol and assigned to area East 2, was dispatched to Loring st at

Osgood st. for a couple arguing on the street, Officer Stanford, E3, was my backup. Upon our arrival we identified the two parties as Krystal Morelli and Anthony Bottari. Myself and Officer Stanford realized that this was the same couple in which we had assisted earlier that morning. The initial call was for a female attempting to harm herself at Kent st. Upon our arrival to this call it was determined that her and her boyfriend were having a verbal disagreement and he believed she was going to harm herself. There was no sign of Ms. Morelli trying to harm herself (no weapon, and no cuts). Her boyfriend,

As I spoke to her boyfriend, he stated to me that she had followed him to his parents home located at Laurel st and that he witnessed her near his vehicle and was worried that she was going to do something to his vehicle because she had made several threats before to do so. As I continued to speak to him, I could see and hear Ms. Morelli become more and more paginated. She continued screaming and at this point several concerned neighbors had come outside to see what

was going on. I approached Ms. Morelli and explained to her that her boyfriend would be seeking a restraining order against her and it was probably best for her to leave him alone. Ms. Morelli continued screaming stating that she was going to go back to their apartment at Kent St and destroy all of his property. She then began walking down Loring st. towards Somerville Ave. I walked after her to explain to her that she was not to touch any of his property she then stated that I needed to

stop following her and that if I touched her she would "punch me in the face." At this point myself and Officer Stanford were concerned for our safety and attempted to place Ms. Morelli in handcuffs, she struggled and the three of us landed on the ground. At this point Ms. Morelli screamed even louder than before and three more neighbors came out of their homes and on to their porches. We finally got Ms. Morelli in the handcuffs and placed her under arrest for disorderly conduct.



Pantanella Arrest



SOMERVILLE PUBLIC LIBRARY TO HOST 'MEET THE AUTHOR' SERIES FOR 2014 SOMERVILLE READS PROGRAM

Meet authors Stephen Puleo and Deborah Kops as part of the City's fifth annual "Somerville Reads" program

SOMERVILLE – The Somerville Public Library launched its fifth annual "Somerville Reads" campaign this summer, selecting Dark Tide by Stephen Puleo as its highlighted 2014 book. Somerville Reads is a project that promotes literacy and community engagement by encouraging all Somerville residents to read and discuss the same book.

Dark Tide retells the events of the Great Boston Molasses flood of 1919. A 50-foot-tall steel tank filled with 2.3 million gallons of molasses collapsed on Boston's waterfront, disgorging its contents as a 15-foot-high wave of molasses that at its outset traveled at 35 miles per hour. It demolished wooden homes, even the brick fire station. The number of dead wasn't known for days. It would be years before a landmark court battle determined who was responsible for the disaster.

The companion children's book, The Great Molasses Flood, Boston 1919 by Deborah Kops chronicles the catastrophic events for younger readers.

As part of the program, the Somerville Public Library is hosting two "Meet the Author" events in September and October, as follows:

- Meet Stephen Puleo, author of Dark Tide. Wednesday, Sept. 17. 7 p.m.
- Meet Deborah Kops, author of The Great Molasses Flood. Sunday, Sept. 21. 3 p.m.

Additionally, the Library will host "Boston, 1919," a talk on the historical context of the Molasses Flood, by Suffolk University professor Patricia Reeves, on Thursday, Oct. 2 at 6:30 p.m. All events will be held at the Central Library, 79 Highland Ave., and are free and open to the public.



Once cook time has been achieved, remove from heat and let stand for 5 minutes. Using a slotted spoon, crack the raft and carefully remove pieces from the soup. Pour remaining soup through a sieve lined with multiple layers of cheese cloth. Season to taste with sea salt and garnish with brunoise of vegetables and seared, diced meat.

Whether you choose to prepare the classic, my twist or your own interpretation, remember that food is about bringing

people together and that the act of cooking is about caring and as long as your heart is in the dish you prepare, the people you are cooking for will appreciate it (and you). Upon my arrival, I was met by AFAS staff. They pointed to the defendant who was sleeping under a park bench approximately, 50-75 feet away. Officer Pavao remained with the AFAS staff to interview them in regards to the incident that occurred. I approached Campos, and tapped the bottom of his foot to wake him. He acknowledged me by stating "Hello Officer," and he unsteadily attempted to lift himself

up off the ground. Observing that he needed assistance in getting up off the grass, I gently grasped his forearm, and upper arm. Once Campos was on his feet, he became extremely tense, and he squared his shoulders in a bladed stance. Campos was quickly guided onto the back of the park bench, and placed in handcuffs for everyone's safety. I spoke to counselors of the school and two children, who stated that

while they were playing in playground, Campos approached one of the children, cussing profanities, and aggressively grabbed his wrist. 





Labor Day fires in Somerville



Somerville firefighters were kept busy this Labor Day, September 1st responding to three fires in the city. The first, and most serious fire, broke out at

approximately 136 a.m. at 53 Josephine Avenue. The three story home suffered extensive fire damage in the rear with smoke and water damage throughout. The rear porches were destroyed and fire spread into the walls and attic of the home. Heat from the fire also damaged the home at 49 Josephine Avenue melting vinyl siding. All three apartments were rendered uninhabitable and the occupants have been displaced. Two Alarms were sounded and one firefighter was transported to the hospital for evaluation after becoming ill at the scene. The cause of the fire is presently undetermined and remains under investigation.

A second fire broke out inside the Herb Chambers Mercedes Benz dealership located at 259 McGrath Highway. Firefighters responding to a fire alarm at 855 a.m. found heavy smoke inside the automotive repair area. A fire was confined to a work bench and wall and controlled by the building's sprinkler system. Firefighters completed extinguishing the fire and assisted with the removal of smoke and water from the facility. The cause of the fire appears to be an electrical malfunction.

The third fire broke out at 8 p.m. on the second floor of 22 Lake Street and was confined to the kitchen of the duplex home. A neighbor reported the fire after spotting smoke coming from a window. Arriving firefighters found heavy smoke in the second floor apartment. Captain William Fitzpatrick and Firefighter Jack Fitzgerald located and rescued an elderly male from the apartment. He was transported to the hospital. The cause of the fire appears to be accidental originating in a microwave oven. Photos courtesy of Somerville F.D.

STYROFOAM BAN ENFORCEMENT IN EFFECT, INFORMATION SENT TO **BUSINESSES**

Information about alternative products provided as City begins enforcement of ordi-

SOMERVILLE - Somerville restaurants and food-related businesses were sent a letter and fact sheet in August detailing the City's ban on the commercial use of expanded polystyrene, commonly known as Styrofoam or foam, along with information about alternative products those businesses can use and the penalties for violating the ordinance that are now in effect.

The ban affects restaurants, delis, food trucks and other food-related businesses, which are no longer allowed to use Styrofoam for cups, plates and carry-out containers. Alternatives include paper and cardboard, plastic, aluminum, biodegradable plastics and compostable materials. Businesses are being encouraged to contact their current vendors to see what alternative options are available. Many businesses in Somerville have already transitioned to foam container alternatives, and all are required to comply.

Beginning Oct. 1, Inspectional Services (ISD) will inspect for the use of prohibited foam food containers during pre-operational inspections, routine inspections and during food license renewals. A first violation of the foam ban will result in a warning, a second violation will result in a \$100 fine, and third and subsequent violations will result in a \$300

The Board of Aldermen unanimously passed the polystyrene ban ordinance in May 2013 prohibiting Somerville restaurants and food establishments from using polystyrene, which is not biodegradable or easily recyclable and contains an ingredient on the U.S. Department of Health's list of carcinogens.

"The City of Somerville is sharing in the commitment to reduce foam use—this year,

Somerville Public Schools stopped using expanded polystyrene trays to serve meals," said Oliver Sellers-Garcia, City Director of Sustainability and Environment. "We look forward to working with our local businesses and encourage them to reach out with any questions they may have, so they can transition to other materials for their business." "The Board of Aldermen passed this ordinance last year because of the impact expanded polystyrene has on our personal health and the health of the environment," said Ward 6 Alderman Rebekah Gewirtz, chairwoman of the Board of Aldermen's Legislative Matters subcommittee. "Our local businesses have been great partners with the City in reducing our impact on the environment, increasing our recycling and making Somerville a healthier city for all, and I know they will partner with us on this initiative too to rid our city of polystyrene."








Mayor Curtatone said "Somerville's Future's so bright, I gotta wear shades."
